- Jeff Irving called the meeting to order at 10:20 am, welcomed those in attendance, and proceeded with introductions and approval of agenda and minutes. The meeting was hosted by McKinley County with special thanks for coffee, snacks and lunch provided.

BACKGROUND
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li><b>Why:</b> The NMDOT distributes federal funding for transportation maintenance and development to metropolitan and rural regions of the state. With limited funding available to rural areas, it is important to have a prioritized list of viable (qualified) projects for funding.</li><li><b>Purpose.</b> The NWRTPO undertakes a new Regional Transportation Improvement Program Recommendations (RTIPR) list of projects that qualify for federal funding in two-year cycles.</li><li><b>Discussion/Finalization.</b> The NWRTPO will undertake this project qualification / prioritization process commencing in June, 2018 and completing in March, 2019 with an updated RTIPR.</li></ul>

WORK TO DATE
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>An updated Call for Projects Guide has been developed to guide the NWRTPO members through the process for identifying qualified projects, and assessing their readiness for phased development, as well as competitiveness for funding.</li><li>In previous cycles, the NWRTPO has trimmed its RTIPR from \$350 million, with many projects that did not qualify for federal funding, down to \$65 million, with all projects listed qualifying for federal funding through the state. The actual documented need for our three-county region of New Mexico is cited at \$777 million.</li></ul>

ANTICIPATED WORK
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>The NWRTPO commenced the RTIPR update in June of 2018. The process will run through March of 2019, with a) submission of Project Feasibility Forms (PFF) due July 31, which if approved as viable for federal \$, will follow with b) submission of Project Prospectus Forms (PPF) due Oct. 26 (replacing PFF's). c) For projects that compete for prioritization, the NWRTPO hears and scores presentations on project need and readiness from each jurisdictional representative at their December meeting. d) The NWRTPO then drafts the RTIPR update, and approve / authorize it at their 2/13/19 meeting; e) <b>At today's meeting DOT District 6 prioritizes projects from their participating RTPO's for the DOT District RTP – referred to as the "zipper" because it blends projects from the NWRTPO (McKinley &amp; Cibola Counties), SWRTPO (Catron County) and MRRTPO (Sandoval County).</b> The DOT Dist. 5 RTP meeting will take place sometime thereafter – incorporating Northern Navajo projects from San Juan County.</li><li>Once projects are cited in the DOT District RTIP, they are within 4-5 years of getting funded, or may need to be re-authorized by the RTPO and DOT District for future funding.</li></ul>

- With little discussion, as most of our members are at this point very familiar with the RTPR and all their submitted projects, and the MRRTPO and SWRTPO representatives were pleased with the priority positioning of their projects in the Dist. 6 RTP. Some discussion on Catron County – NM12 project as to whether it could be phased because it came at a non-competitive (high) cost. Motion to approve and authorize: Gaylord Slow - Laguna; 2<sup>nd</sup>: Dave Deusawe - Acoma; all in favor, none opposed.
- A question arose about FLAP funding – who does the construction – locals, state or feds; and what about tribal lands. Bob K. mentioned the federal program may have its own crew for such projects if he recalls correctly what Laurie Miskimmins (Federal Lands Program Coordinator for our region) had indicated, but will follow up with her on this matter.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• <b>Why?</b> RTPO members, along with the local government leaders they serve (due to personnel turnover) are not always aware of the process by which the NMDOT Districts move projects (based on regional priority and readiness) into the NMDOT Statewide STIP, along with timelines relevant to available funding and DOT priorities responding to federal oversight.</li><li>• <b>Purpose.</b> Provide a better understanding of how the NMDOT prioritizes and selects projects for funding, based on local, regional, NMDOT and federal statewide transportation priorities; along with the process for moving projects thru the DOT Districts into the statewide STIP.</li><li>• <b>Discussion/Finalization.</b> DOT Dist. 6 staff will cover and inform on this process, and answer questions through discussion.</li></ul>

B. Local Member Reports & Updates:

1. Pueblo of Acoma:
  - Ramond Concho Jr. has joined the Pueblo’s Community Development Office as the Transportation Planner, having stepped down in the recent appointments, from his role as 1<sup>st</sup> Lt. Governor for the Pueblo.
  - The Pueblo of Acoma has been named a case study of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) for its successful application of the CMGC process (*Construction Management / General Contractor*). Mr. Deutsawe was part of a national webinar on 2/7/19 for the “Every Day Counts 5” national initiative on the subject of project bundling which is a new innovation of EDC5.
  - CMGC – 2 Projects: (*request for proposals for this new bundle of projects was published 2/10/19*)
    - CMGC-10 Transportation Office Complex – NEPA work is completed; categorical exclusion received. Request for proposals received. POA selection team completed its scoring and will have interviews 3/14/19; Notice of Award anticipated for 3/22/19.
    - CMGC-11 SP130 Veterans Blvd. – NEPA work is completed; categorical exclusion received. Request for proposals received. POA selection team completed its scoring and will have interviews 3/14/19; Notice of Award anticipated for 3/22/19.
    - CMGC-12 Baseball Fields - NEPA work is completed; categorical exclusion received. CDO working with Realty to complete the Grant of Easements and ROW. POA selection team completed its scoring and will have interviews 3/14/19; Notice of Award anticipated for 3/22/19.
    - CMGC-14 FEMA 4352 Large Projects (39) – Ready for recovery; all NEPA documents have been completed by FEMA’s Environmental Historic Preservation Office. Request for proposals received. POA selection team completed its scoring and will have interviews 3/14/19; Notice of Award anticipated for 3/22/19.
  - BIA Legacy Projects:
    - SP302, GE Pino Roads – all documentation has been submitted to the BIA SWRO Division of Transportation for their PS&E review. Received 100% PS&E on 3/6/19. Ready to present to the Governor for his signature.
    - Mesa Hill Road and Bridge Project: PS&E completed. Applied to several federal and other funding mechanisms for construction; still waiting for a response from the US DOT whether we have been awarded.
    - The Pueblo is continuing on the update to their Long-Range Transportation Plan; anticipate completion by September, 2019
    - Pinsbaari Drive Corridor Development Study: Possible funds have been identified through the Capital Outlay Process; these funds would help create a Mainstreet Project for economic development.

- FEMA 4352: Small Projects: Recovery work has begun; the POA Public Works / Utility Authority was awarded the small projects (64) at \$2.2 million capital investment.
- TTP: Received approved 2019-2023 Tribal Transportation Improvement Plan from FHWA.

2. Pueblo of Zuni:

- No new news.

3. McKinley County (report from last month):

- Johnson Road Project: Complete: Chip Seal 4.2 miles; Base Course 6.3 miles
- TIF: \$1.2 million awarded for 10 miles of Deer Springs Road improvement – Mexican Springs Chapter
- TIF: \$1.3 million awarded for 18 miles of CR19 road improvement – multiple Eastern Navajo Chapters
- The County is chip sealing local roads with LGRF funds as weather permits – C37 in Tohtachi next on list
- There are some special FY2019 appropriations that the County will apply to current projects
- County is waiting on the weather to continue construction on most of their projects

4. Gallup:

- In close out with NMDOT Dist. 6 for the Allison Bridge Replacement project and NM118 Pedestrian Safety Projects
- Veterans Cemetery Access Road: Bid awarded, pre-con scheduled, working with DOT Dist. 6 on certifications, scheduled to open on Memorial Day.
- Working on Coop Project certifications to rehabilitate a number of city streets
- Sky City CDBG project is complete and in close out with NM-Dept. of Finance Admin.; fiscal audit completed in December, 2018
- Working on LGRF and MAP Applications for next fiscal year, to be forwarded to DOT Dist. 6
- Coal Avenue Event Street: design at 60% at this time.

5. Milian (not present this meeting – last report as follows):

- Motel Drive project continues, obtained extension through October 12
- Coop funded project for drainage behind Allsups is at 90% design
- Sand Street bridge in design
- Mirabol Park – pursuing funding, hope to start in December or January

6. Ramah:

- BIA Projects Update: BIA 125 mp 18 – 24.6 - developed categorical exclusion documents; and continuing to coordinate with Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Office for BIA 125 MP O – 4.4 and BIA 195. Developing Right of Way documents for BIA 195. Begin environmental survey and will start land survey once weather has cleared for BIA 125 MP O – 4.4 Pond design. Coordinating with Ramah BIA Office for alignment locations on allotted lands.
- Appointed RNDOT Roads Foreman Mr. Jonathan Henio, as Alternate member for Ramah
- Emergency snow removal with coordination of 638 Departments and Pine Hill Clinic.
- Heavy Equipment maintenance and repairs
- Met with Program Managers – RNSB, Pine Hill Clinic and PD to begin a local ALERT plan for addressing emergencies.
- Submitted final updated TTIP Plan for FHWA TTP.
- Developing an RFP for ADA compliance study in Pine Hill.
- Ongoing general maintenance for area roads, cattle guards and signage, blading and shaping, pot holes and base course patching (incl. school bus routes). Cleaning and replacing roadway signs. Field fence repairs, post replacements and gate repairs.

7. Cibola County:

- ZMTP RTP trail project is funded for FFY2019 construction.
- ICFP approved for the County
- Capital Outlay awarded for road maintenance and new Sheriff vehicles

- W/H Pacific helping to identify data gaos

8. Grants:

- Riverwalk trail: will bid in March for phase 1
- 1<sup>st</sup> Street phase 2 and 2<sup>nd</sup> Street phase 4-5 to bid for construction in April.
- First phase for high school trail to commence this summer.
- The next major project will Roosevelt Road and Bridge.

9. Pueblo of Laguna:

- NM 124 Trail- Parale to the Kawaika Center, a bike/ped path: Construction is in progress and currently at 50% complete, completion date is anticipated April 2019. NMDOT performed their 30% inspection audit on 2/11/19.
- NM 124 Trail- Encinal Road to St. Rd. 279, a bike/ped path: The Construction Management services firm selected is Bohannan Huston Inc. A meeting with FHWA was held in late December to discuss the letting schedule. The project will be bid in first quarter.
- L26 Rainfall Road from Cubero Wash to Seama bridge M108: The project is in bidding, with a due date of March 8. The project will be presented to the Tribal Council March 14, with a recommendation of award. Construction is anticipated for mid-April, 2019.
- M137 bridge at Laguna to Laguna Subdivision: Construction is complete, with a punch list for a few minor items to be complete when temperatures are above 45 degrees, anticipated in April, 2019.
- Mill, Overlay, Striping & Enhancements Project: for L503 Veterans Memorial Rd, L200 Postal Road and L245 Raindrop Road. Construction has resumed March 1 for L503 and L200; completion anticipated for May, 2019.
- BIA Road Maintenance Striping Project: Routes-L22 Casa Blanca Road, L500 Central Park Rd, L200 Twin Lakes Rd, L200 Old Bridge Rd, L200 Porkhop Hill Rd and L200 Elizabeth Bender Rd. The project will be bid in the spring of 2019.
- NM 124 Roundabout: The repairs to the roundabout are being coordinated by NMDOT, no start date has been determined.
- L24 Rainfall Road: design changed to two phases, Ph-1 Road & Trail and Ph-2 Conc Box Underpass, design is in progress
- L26 Deer Dancer Road: at 90% design, working on ROW amendments
- L243 Acorn Road design: completed 100% design, pending design review with the BIA
- M154 Paguate Wash Bridge: PER in progress
- M108 San Jose River Bridge-Seama: PS&E complete and ROW amendments approved. The Engineer of Record will update Estimate, for submission to BIA for construction funding.
- Planning and Design Request for Proposal: RFP for design services for L248 Bluejay Road and L248 Blue Star Loop, will be published March 2019.
- The Pueblo's Safety Plan is completed.

9. Northern Navajo (not present this meeting – submitted report as follows):

NM DOT Safety Projects:

- NMDOT and Shiprock Chapter are working on safety road improvement and pedestrian trails of Shiprock HS corridor on Hwy 64 west of Hwy 491/64 intersection.
- Project planning with Becabito Chapter on safety project on Hwy 64 at MP 3-0-3.5 for street lighting
- TseDaKaKa Chapter safety project to improve Hwy 64 & N5031 Intersection. Application was updated and submitted for HSIP funding. Pending with NMDOT.
- San Juan Chapter Bridge project connecting N36 to Hwy 64 near Hogback. The feasibility studies were completed by contractor, Wilson & Company. This project would involve coordination with NM DOT and NM State Representative State Representative, Anthony Allison and other State Legislators.
- Upper Fruitland Chapter is working on Safety Project at Hwy 371 & N36 Intersection for improvement. This project would involve coordination with NM DOT, and NM State Representative Anthony Allison and other State Legislators.
- Sheep Springs Chapter is working on safety project to improve intersection at Hwy 491/134, to reduce traffic crashes and pedestrian cross walks.

## Monthly Report – March 2019

- A. **FFY 19-20 NWRTPO Call For Projects Cycle:** The NWRTPO completed another Call for Projects cycle that runs from June, 2018 through March, 2019. The finalized FFY2020 – 2024 RTPR stands at a total of \$64,596,000; with 4 Roadway projects, 7 Planning & Studies projects, 2 TAP projects, 2 RTP projects, 2 Bridge projects, 1 FLAP project, and 8 Safety projects, for a total of 26 projects for our region; all of which qualify for federal funding per functional classification. The DOT District 6 RTP (“Zipper”) was finalized at a total of \$73,571,000; incorporating one Roadway project for Catron County of the SWRTPO, and one CMAQ project for Sandoval County of the MRRTPO.
- B. **Federal Lands Access Program (FLAP) Funding:** Federal Lands Access Program Funding applications were due by 1/15/19. At this time, there appears to be one FLAP application for our region that involves shoulder improvements for a 1.6 mile stretch of NM547 (Lobo Canyon Road) from the Grants city limits to the Continental Divide Trailhead, which will provide safer bike and pedestrian access.
- C. **Funding Opportunities:** Beside the INFRA funding opportunity below, there were / are currently additional funding opportunities for transportation infrastructure or services including a) Local Govt. Road Fund – due March 15; b) Indian Highway Safety Grants (thanks Ron Shuitiva); and c) Rural Business Development Grant (less transportation related).
- D. **GIS Data Gathering, Mapping and Compiling Work:** RTPO staff need to re-invigorate our outreach to our three Pueblos – Laguna, Acoma and Zuni regarding the opportunity to include their transportation mapping and data into our regional portfolio, based on what each Pueblo is willing to share. COG staff continue to provide technical assistance and GIS mapping for development of 66 new miles of recreational trails in the Zuni Mountains in McKinley and Cibola Counties during FFY18 – FFY19; and continue contributing GIS mapping for regional transportation infrastructure.
- E. **NWRTPO Regional Transportation Plan:** RTPO staff have conducted annual updates to our R.T.P. at this time, and anticipate more updates in the year ahead, as the NMDOT (State plan) is coming into the 4-year major update cycle. Our RTPO may not need major updates to our plan, as we constantly update it on an annual basis.
- F. **NWRTPO Regional Work Program – FFY2019 – FFY2020:** The RWP for FFY2019 has been finalized and approved by NMDOT as follows: 1) Long Range Plng. 250 hrs., 2) Tech. Support/ Data Mgmt. 200 hrs., 3) Project Dev. 400 hrs., 4) Other Activities 200 hrs., 5) General RTPO Support 600 hrs., 6) RTPO Admin. 450 hrs.
- G. **2<sup>nd</sup> Round of INFRA Funding:** USDOT / FHWA announced a second round of INFRA funding in December, 2018; this source funds large / major projects. NWRTPO members are invited to explore this funding opportunity for projects within their respective jurisdictions.
- H. **NMDOT Road Safety Audit and Safety Plan for Gallup:** NM DOT staff have collaborated with COG / RTPO staff and City of Gallup leaders and administration to undertake a Road Safety audit for the downtown area, centered around 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Street rail crossings, and have been meeting with support from Wilson & Co. for development of a City wide Safety Plan, addressing issues in high accident incidence areas.
- I. **FHWA 2 CFR-200 Training:** This is a mandatory two day training which will take place May 14-15 in Albuquerque or Santa Fe, to cover the guidance around updates for federal transportation funding requirements and regulation, for local government projects. Location yet to be established.
- J. **National Regional Transportation Conference:** This year’s national transportation conference will take place June 17-19 in Columbus, Ohio; registration opened on April 4, 2019.

# NMDOT District 6 STIP Process

## STIP Overview

- What is the Statewide Transportation Improvement Plan?
- The STIP is a list of all FEDERALLY funded projects to be completed within District 6 within the next 4 years. This list is maintained by the District.
- There are two parts to the STIP:
  - 1) District 6 manages a list of District led priority projects to be let within the next four years.
  - 2) The District is also responsible for maintaining a list of Local Lead priority projects that receive federal funding and are expected to be completed within 4 years within the STIP.



# NMDOT District 6 STIP Process

## STIP Overview

- NMDOT produces a 6 year STIP every 2 years. Amendments to the STIP are processed throughout the two year cycle.
- The 6 year STIP includes 4 fiscally constrained years with years 5 and 6 considered the planning years which are not fiscally constrained
- Each NMDOT District establishes the District STIP based on annual funding allocated to the District (approximately \$20 million).
- Current STIP covers FY 2018 to FY 2023
- Upcoming STIP will cover FY 2020 to FY 2025.
- This is the best opportunity to add regionally significant projects that are not currently in the STIP

## NMMDOT District 6 STIP Process STIP Projects

- Which projects are included in STIP?
- NMMDOT District 6 includes all District priority projects projected to be completed within the next 4 years using District funds in the STIP
- All local lead projects that receive federal funding and will be completed within the next 4 years should also be included within the STIP

- What types projects are included in STIP?
- Types of projects that can be included in the STIP include:

1) Planning documents, studies or design

2) Right-of-Way coordination

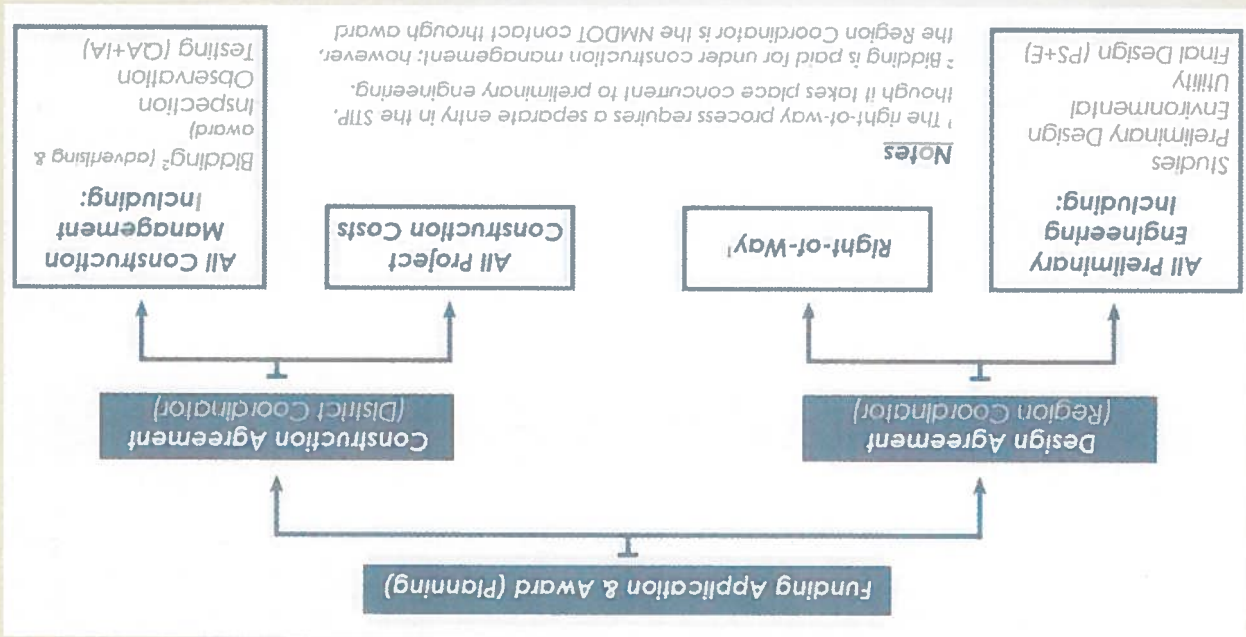

## NMMDOT District 6 STIP Process

### When is a project placed in STIP?

- When is a project placed into the STIP?
- Once the Notice of Award is signed by all parties, the NMMDOT General Office informs District 6 of the award and the project is placed into STIP
- Although District 6 inputs the project into the STIP, the project itself is managed by Central Region Design. District 6 is not the primary coordinator.

## NMMDOT District 6 STIP Process

### When is project placed in STIP

- All projects in the STIP require the following information:
  - 1) Detailed Project Scope, Location and Work Type
  - 2) Project Cost (detailed)
  - 3) Project Funding (to cover all project costs) – all funding sources must be identified and funding must be secured
  - 4) Project Lead Agency
  - 5) Project Phase (planning or design, right-of-way, utilities, construction and/or construction management)
- This is the same information required for the Agreement Request Form and Control Number request form.

## NMDOT District 6 STIP Process STIP Project Requirements

- T/LPA projects incorporated into District STIP require cooperative agreements prior to initiation. These agreements define the funding, rights and duties for each party and are coordinated through the Central Region Design
- T/LPA design development projects must meet all federal and state requirements, obtain all project certifications (including the right-of-way process and environmental certification) and follow the NMDOT project development process for design and NMDOT standard specifications for construction
- Additional project specific agreements (maintenance, signal and lighting, ...) may also be required prior to completing the project design



## NMMDOT District 6 STIP Process Important Reminders

- STIP funding is a reimbursement program
- No work can start before the Cooperative Agreement for the project is approved
- All documents and requirements are closely audited. Failure to provide required documentation or exclusion of any requirements will jeopardize reimbursement
- If a project is on the District STIP and all required agreements and documents are not in place prior to the end of that fiscal year, NMMDOT may decide to postpone or entirely eliminate project from District STIP


## NMMDOT District 6 STIP Process STIP Summary

- All projects receiving federal funding must be included on the STIP
- Project Feasibility Form (PFF) should closely match project type identified within STIP
- RPOs coordinate and establish individual Regional Transportation Improvement Program Recommendations (RTIPR)
- NMMDOT may identify projects within the RTIPR that are eligible for District funding and may be placed into the District STIP
- Agencies can request funding for RTIPR projects or use local funds with NMMDOT concurrence. If these funds are federal, the project will need to be placed into the STIP and follow all federal and state requirements
- T/LPA can pursue separate federal funding for individual projects
- District 6 is informed of STIP projects through Notice of Award. Central Region is typically primary contact for these projects

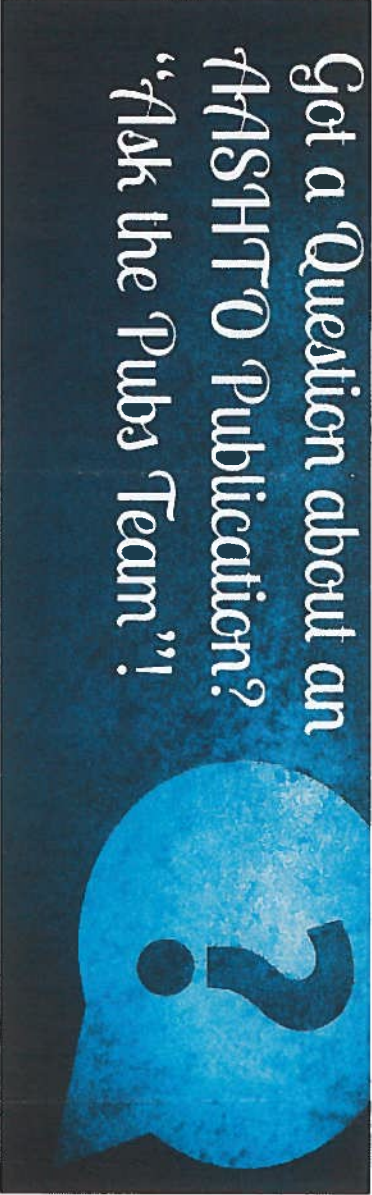
First, we now support the Bluebeam PDF reader as an alternative to Adobe Acrobat for viewing PDFs;

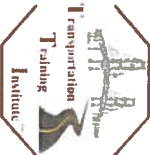

The report also reviewed completed projects from fiscal years 2010 – 2014 and found that 66 percent of recipients were successful in meeting their goals, and over one-third were able to sustain their air service improvements for two years after the grant concluded. ## Bridge safety: It'll take more than 80 years to repair the 47,000 structurally deficient bridges in America, report finds

Officials have dubbed Monday's bridge collapse in Tennessee a freak accident, but that might be turning a blind eye to a larger issue.

Bridges across the United States are deteriorating, and a new report estimates it will take more than 80 years to fix all of them.

More than 47,000 bridges in the United States are in crucial need of repairs, says the American Road and Transportation Builders Association, or ARTBA. The group, which advocates for investment in transportation infrastructure, analyzes data from the Federal Highway Administration and releases an annual Deficient Bridge report.

This year's report, released Monday and based on 2018 data, found:

- There are 616,087 bridges in America
- Of those, 47,052 (nearly 8%) are "structurally deficient" and need urgent repairs
- 235,020 bridges (38%) need some sort of repair





- Americans cross structurally deficient bridges 178 million times a day, including such landmarks as the Brooklyn Bridge and the San Mateo–Hayward Bridge over the San Francisco Bay

- The average age of a structurally deficient bridge is 62 years

The states with the highest number of compromised bridges are:

- Iowa (4,675)
- Pennsylvania (3,770)
- Oklahoma (2,540)
- Illinois (2,273)
- Missouri (2,116)

The definition of 'structurally deficient' has narrowed

"Structurally deficient" means the bridge needs repairs but is not unsafe for public travel.

The number of structurally deficient bridges is actually down about 7,000 from last year's report -- but it's no cause for celebration. Not all the bridges were fixed.

Instead, the number likely dropped so much because the Federal Highway Administration, or FHWA, narrowed the definition of what it means for a bridge to be structurally deficient.

Bridges are regularly inspected for safety on a scale of 0 to 9.

Structurally deficient means that one of four key elements of the bridge is rated a 4, which is poor, or below.

Before, bridges could also be classified as structurally deficient if their overall structural evaluation was rated 4 or lower, or if they had insufficient waterway openings.

"(The new definition) does make a difference," ARTBA chief economist Alison Black said. "About 6,500 bridges that would've been structurally deficient are not under this (new) definition."

**Repairs are at their slowest in five years**

The report's projection for how long it will take to fix all the structurally deficient bridges has more than doubled since last year's estimate of 37 years.

Because the current pace of repair work is at its slowest in five years, it will likely take more than 80 years to complete the repairs on the structures that need it, ARTBA said.

"We've seen bridge construction activity slow down the last few years after increasing significantly over the last 10 years," Black said, adding that some states are focusing on improving pavement conditions instead of bridge repair.

But an FHWA spokeswoman painted a different picture. She said bridge conditions in the United States have steadily improved over the years due to ongoing bridge safety efforts led by FHWA and state departments of transportation. Since 2002, the number of bridges

nationwide that are classified as poor has decreased from 11% to 8%, she said.

Bridge closures are likely to become more frequent

Although Black said bridge collapses are uncommon, bridge closures or weight limits may become more frequent to ensure motorists' safety.

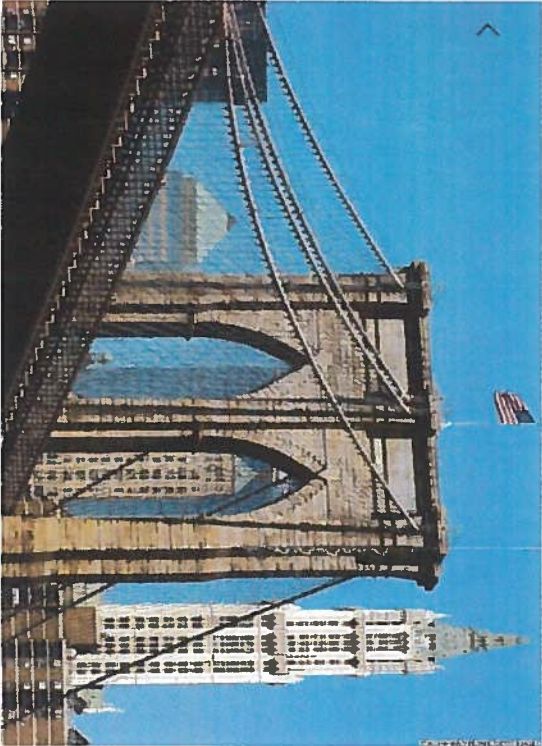
Black pointed to Mississippi, whose Department of Transportation said last week that 61 bridges need to be closed immediately because of unsafe conditions.

"We'll continue to see more bridges close or posted for load as bridges deteriorate," making it difficult for commuters to get around, Black said.

She said an increase in federal transportation funding would help alleviate the issue.

President Trump has said repeatedly that he wants to upgrade America's crumbling infrastructure. Even though some Democratic leaders have expressed a willingness to work with him on a plan, little progress has been made on the issue.

Additional Board Questions & Answers:



(1) **2020 Consensus Revenue Projections** for the State of New Mexico will be presented at the August Legislative Finance Committee (LFC) meeting in Red River.

(2) **House Bill 6 Remote Sellers** did not change in Concurrence Committee and the [FIR](#) was updated on 3/27/19. Again, I would await NMML and NMC analysis before jumping out on this.

- *Remote Sellers and Marketplace Facilitators*. Taxes remote (Internet) sales immediately and then applies local GRT increments and moves to destination-based sourcing (sourcing at the location of the buyer rather than the seller) with a two-year delay (effective July 1, 2019 and July 1, 2021, respectively);
  - The transition to destination-based sourcing is a significant change to the structure of the GRT and will require much preparation by the Taxation and Revenue Department and taxpayers
  - The bill distributes \$24 million annually from the general fund to local governments in FY20-FY21 until the local increments are applied to remote sales
  - Once destination sourcing take effect, all sales will have an in-state location, so current GRT transactions coded as out of state would be shifted into counties and municipalities (if inside municipal boundaries)

### FOCUS ON: RESULTS

Whether you are happy or disappointed in the outcomes, there is no that can argue that each legislator earned their \$161 per day per diem. The pace of this Session resulted in the historic passage of bills. Monumental legislation was passed from a Tax Reform package (HB6), Energy Transition Act, and Ethics Commission.

Major focus points this Session surround public education including the Martinez/Vazzie lawsuits, Federal Impact Aid, and the State's funding formula. School districts, tribal entities, local governments, and legislators in our region are united in trying to ride a wave of momentum to make historic changes and redefine sufficient education for all New Mexicans.

Transportation was also a big winner with \$250M going to the Department of Major Infrastructure Projects, \$50M going into a new local government transportation projects fund, and an increased budget to reduce maintenance backlogs.

Capital Outlay reached nearly \$1B in spending for projects around the State to improve critical infrastructure and build facilities. Our region faired well in this regards and projects need to be fast-tracked.

# QUICK REVIEW

*Your Council of Governments participates and maintains a presence for the entire Session, as a service to our members, our rural and tribal communities, and our Legislators. We are here to serve your needs and track items of interest for our members. Our organization does not lobby but we understand our region and communities, making us valuable to Legislators, staff, and your hired lobbyists as an informational resource.*

The following are some details on the funding bills. This information should be verified before taking action, as it still awaits Governor action.

**House Bill 2 (State Budget).** House Bill 2 (Rep. Lundstrom)

**This bill provides operating budget for the State including all Departments and their programs.**

New Mexico's revenue forecast expects \$1.1 billion in additional funds during the next fiscal year or 17% increase over the current annual general fund budget. This is based on the volatile oil and gas industry and risk of sudden price shocks. The State's current budget framework puts 20% in reserves and this budget takes New Mexico over the \$7B watermark. But this surplus has allowed the Legislature to restore deficiencies, backfill programs, and increase compensation to State workers.

**House Bill 2 Junior.** House Bill 548 (Rep. Lundstrom) and Senate Bill 536 (Senator Smith)

**These bills allowed individual legislators to make additional appropriations to State agencies to add funding to programs, pilots, or special initiatives.** These appropriations will go to the State agencies and if earmarked for local programs will be contracted to local governments.

**Capital Outlay Bills. There are typically three bills that we follow in this category, including**

- (1) Capital Outlay Projects Bill.** This bill typically funds statewide, regional, and local projects using severance tax, general fund, and/or other State funding.
- (2) Capital Outlay Reauthorization Bill.** This bill allows legislators to change the timeframe, purpose, or other legislative language on previously approved capital outlay appropriations.
- (3) General Obligation Bond Bill.** This bill is typically done in 30-day Session (even year sessions) for projects in the categories of public education, higher education, senior projects, and libraries. If passed, projects will go out to the voters as bond issues for ratification.

This year, we are expecting that these bills will be embodied as follows:

Senate Bill 280 (Senator Cisneros). Capital Outlay Expenditures. This bill includes nearly \$1B in capital outlay projects that will be funded via the General Fund with one-time monies.

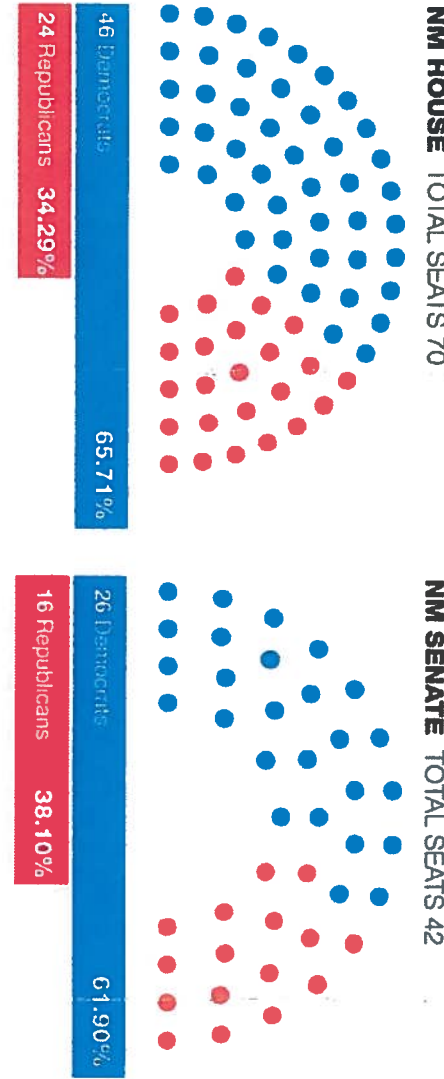

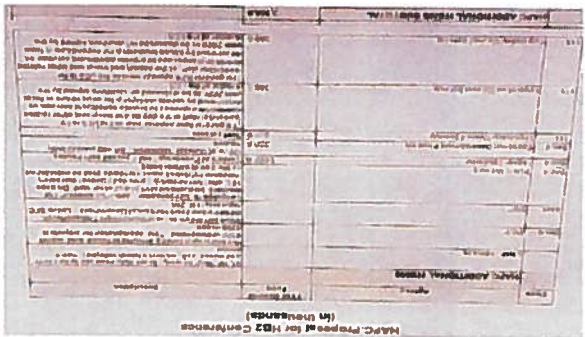
