What is Capital Outlay? Capital improvement projects are funded through (A) Severance Tax Bonds (STB) which are revenues from oil, gas and natural resources through bond capacities and credit rating; or (B) General Funds (GF) which are taxes on oil, gas and natural resources.

- The acquisition, improvement, alteration, or reconstruction of local assets, or
- The maintenance, upgrade, acquirement, and/or repair of local assets.

EX: A fire station project that requires land acquisition, planning, design, construction and equipment.

Types of Capital Outlay:

- 2-year Projects purchase of equipment, vehicles, etc.
- 4-year Projects construction, rehabilitation, property acquisition, etc.

Reauthorization — Changes to a previously funded project.

- Scope of Work (SOW) or Agency.
- Deadline extensions.

SUBMISSION DEADLINE: THURSDAY, JANUARY 12TH, BY 3:00pm

HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

- Capital Outlay opened Wednesday, October 19, 2022.
- Pre-Session Deadline: Thursday, January 12, 2023, by 3:00PM.
- Reauthorization Deadline: Monday, February 13, 2023, by 3:00PM.
 - Does not require a legislator's signature.
 - Automatically submitted to the legislators and the Governor.

The NM Legislative Session begins on Tuesday, January 17, 2023:


• Legislators and the Governor will be given a list of capital project requests.

Capital Outlay 2023 Timeline

- Nov Dec 2022: Submit Capital Outlay Requests
- Legislative Session (60-day): January 17 March 18, 2023
- June/October Bond Sales
- July Grant Agreements
- October CPMS Quarterly Reporting (until funding has been fully expended).

Capital Outlay funding is administered and managed by the NMDFA's Capital Outlay Bureau.

Grant Agreement Process for Sponsored Project Requests:

- Applicants must be in compliance with Executive Order 2013-006 (EO-6).
 - o registered with the Secretary of State
 - o current with audit reporting with the Office of the State Auditor
- Anti-Donation Clause.
 - Funding cannot use state funds to disproportionately benefit one individual, household, entity or organization
- Monthly Reporting through CPMS database. Can be accessed through the ICIP online portal. http://cpms.dfa.state.nm.us/login.aspx



NMED FUNDING OVERVIEW (BIPARTISAN INFRASTRUCTURE BILL)

- BIL Federal Funds funneling through the NM Environment Department
- Funding available on a quarterly basis
- Competitive, based on MHI
- Request for supporting documents
- Initially offered as loans with 0.01% interest rates; potentially 75% to 100% grants

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How to Submit a Reauthorization Request

Reauthorization request forms are available online at https://www.nmlegis.gov/Publications/Capital_Outlay/capital_outlay_reauth_form.pdf
The deadline to submit a reauthorization request is 3:00 p.m., Monday, February 13, 2023.
Hard copies of the form are available from the Legislative Council Service (LCS) office.
Reauthorization request forms require a sponsor's signature, and must be submitted to the LCS office by the deadline.
Bring two copies of the signed form to the LCS office. The forms will be date-stamped and one copy of the form will be returned to you.
For assistance in completing the form contact the LCS Capital Outlay Division at 986-4600.

Reauthorization requests may be submitted for appropriations made in previous years in order to extend the time of expenditure, change, clarify or expand the scope of the project, or to change the administering agency.

The criteria used to measure affordability status is Median Household Income (MHI) compared to the most recent National 5 year average.

Disadvantaged Status: MHI greater than 75% but less than 100% **Severely Disadvantaged Status:** MHI 75% or less

These counties automatically meet the affordability criteria for Disadvantaged Status (highlighted in blue):





Drinking Water State Revolving Fund

Quick Facts Summary



The Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) is a federal-state program that provides low-cost financial assistance to water systems for a wide range of drinking water projects

WHO MAY APPLY?

Public Water Systems that meet the following criteria:

Technical: Obtain an adequate & reliable source of water; establish & maintain an adequate infrastructure; employ operators with technical knowledge.

Managerial: Accountability over system; responsive to system demands; ability to work with jurisdictional, regulatory, & other governmental agencies, trade organizations, & persons served by the system.

Financial: Established user rates that cover maintenance, operations, debt service, & required reserves; maintain creditworthiness; establish & maintain adequate fiscal controls and accounting methods required for the operation of the system & ability to repay a DWSRF loan.

Systems in significant noncompliance with any requirement of a national primary drinking water regulation are not eligible to receive DWSRF assistance **unless** it is determined that the assistance will ensure compliance.

WHAT PROJECTS ARE ELIGIBLE?

In general, a project is eligible for DWSRF assistance as long as it addresses present or prevents future violations of health-based drinking water standards. Project categories are: Treatment, Transmission & Distribution, Source, Storage, Consolidation, Creation of New Systems, Rehabilitation of Dams & Reservoirs, and Purchase of Water Rights. There are also Set-Aside Funds which give states the flexibility through a wide range of activities to help public water systems address compliance challenges that do not require capital investment.

WHAT KIND OF FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE?

LOANS + SUBSIDY

Interest rates depend on the type of system taking the the loan & if the system is disadvantaged. Loan amortization period is 30-40 years depending on disadvantage status. Current interest rates are:

- Non-disadvantaged Entities 0.01%
- Disadvantaged Entities 0% & principal forgiveness up to 50%
- Severely Disadvantaged Entities 0% & principal forgiveness up to 75%
- Private non-profit water system 3% loan only
- Private for-profit water system 4% loan only

WHAT ARE THE AFFORDABILITY CRITERIA?

Median Household Income (MHI) compared to the most recent National 5 year average is the criteria used to measure affordability status. If the applicant's MHI is greater than 75% but less than 100%, they are eligible for Disadvantaged status. To be considered a Severely Disadvantaged entity the applicant's MHI must be 75% or less.

If the water system is located in the following 15 New Mexican Counties,

Disadvantaged status is already given:

- Catron
- Colfax
- Guadalupe
- Harding
- Lincoln
- Luna
- Mora
- Quay
- Roosevelt
- San Miguel
- Sierra
- Socorro
- Taos
- Torrance
- Union



You can still qualify for Disadvantaged & Severely Disadvantaged status if your water system falls outside of these counties!

THE APPLICATION PROCESS

START at NMED Drinking Water Bureau:

env.nm.gov/drinking_water/infrastructure-projects-and-funding

- Submit a pre-application form & required documents to determine eligibility & demonstrate technical, managerial, & financial capacity.
- DWB reviews application materials for completeness.
- DWB scores project based on set criteria.
- DWB develops a quarterly Priority List based on project score & ranking.
- DWB publishes Priority List & sends to NMFA for review & funding approval.

FINISH at NM Finance Authority:

- NMFA receives Priority List from DWB
- NMFA will contact the applicants in Fundable status & invite them to submit a final loan application.
- NMFA determines financial status for debt capacity & potential subsidy amount.
- NMFA presents eligible applicants to the NMFA Board for approval.
- NMFA will work with applicants on drafting final documents to close the loan.

Applications are accepted year-round. Priority List is created quarterly.

Quarter 1 ends March 31 (January, February, March)

Quarter 2 ends June 30 (April, May, June)

Quarter 3 ends September 30 (July, August, September)

Quarter 4 ends December 31 (October, November, December)

Section 595 NEW MEXICO ENVIRONMENTAL INFRASTRUCTURE AND RESOURCE PROTECTION

WHAT CAN THE CORPS DO? Section 595 of the Water Resources Development Act 1999, as amended provides authority for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to enter into cost sharing agreements with non-Federal sponsors on publicly owned environmental projects in several states including New Mexico. Under Section 595 authority, assistance may be in the form of design and construction for water related environmental infrastructure and resource protection and development projects including projects for wastewater treatment and related facilities, water supply, environmental restoration, and surface water resource protection and development.

Project costs are shared on a 75% Federal, 25% non-Federal basis. The non-Federal sponsor shall receive credit for land, easements, rights-of-way, and relocations toward the non-Federal share of project costs not to exceed 25% of the total project costs. Additionally, the non-Federal sponsor may receive credit for the reasonable cost of design work completed prior to entering into the project cooperation agreement.

WHAT ARE THE LOCAL RESPONSIBILITIES? Costs for the Section 595 projects are shared between the Federal government (75%) and the non-Federal sponsor (25%). The non-Federal sponsor must have the legal and financial capability to fulfill the project cooperation requirements below:

- Contribute 25% of the project costs
- Establish such legal and institutional structures necessary to insure the long-term operation of the project
- Hold and save the Government free from all damages arising from design, construction, operation, maintenance, repair, rehabilitation and replacement of the project
- Assume 100% of the operation and maintenance costs for the project when completed

HOW CAN HELP BE REQUESTED? We may begin a Section 595 project after receipt of a written request from the prospective sponsor. A sample letter is offered below:

Dear Sir:

This letter is to seek the assistance of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers under Section 595 of the Water Resources Development Act of 1999, as amended for the publicly owned facilities servicing (city, town, county, etc).

(Briefly describe the nature and severity of the problem and the facilities needed to correct the problem.)

We understand that once a project partnership agreement (PPA) is completed the non-Federal sponsor would be required to pay 25% of the cost for the project. The non-Federal sponsor shall also receive credit for designs completed prior to the PCA, land, easements, rights-of-way, and relocations toward the non-Federal share of project costs not to exceed 25% of the total project costs. Once the project is constructed, the non-Federal sponsor will be responsible for 100% of the operation and maintenance costs of the project.
