



NWNMCOG Water Commons, May 17, 2023



The New Mexico Finance Authority is a government instrumentality created by the New Mexico Legislature in 1992. The mission of NMFA is to advance New Mexico by financing impactful, well-planned projects. NMFA offers a variety of financing programs for infrastructure, capital equipment, and economic development.





Water Project Fund Overview

The Water Project Finance Act created the **16-member Water Trust Board**, composed of a diverse set of water users and experts.

NMFA, on behalf of the WTB, **annually accepts applications** for water projects to be funded from the Water Project Fund.

WTB **recommends a list of projects to the Legislature** to be authorized for funding from the Water Project Fund.

The Act requires the WTB consider projects that:

- leverage local and federal funds;
- are shovel-ready;
- are identified as "urgent to meet the needs of a regional water plan accepted by the Interstate Stream Commission";
- implement the State Water Plan



What kinds of water projects can be funded?

- Water storage, conveyance and delivery
- Flood prevention
- Water conservation or treatment, recycling and reuse
- Watershed restoration and management
- Endangered Species Act collaborative implementation

NEW MEXICO FINANCE**AUTHORITY** 

Water Project Fund

Water Trust Board Policies require:

- minimum contributions from applicants in the form of local or federal matching funds; waivers may apply
- loan component of between 10% 40% for projects supported by a rate-paying constituency; waivers may apply
- to the greatest extent possible, awards will be sized to projects that represent a functional project or stand-alone phase of a project that can be accomplished within 12-24 months of award
- applicants applying for one or more projects in a given cycle may not receive more than 15% of the available funds in any year



## Water Project Fund

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The Water Project Fund annually receives 9% of senior Severance Tax Bonds and a distribution from the Water Trust Fund, creating a reliable revenue stream for the program.

Water Trust Board awards are a **combination of grants and loans, (with required match component).** Size of the loan is dependent on the financial capacity of the applicant.

Match is determined by project type, size of request and entities MHI.

Estimated available funding for the 2024 cycle was between \$130 - \$135 million.





Water Project Fund Policy Amendments

The Water Trust Board anticipates an increase in funding over the next few years, which will help finance more water projects in NM.

Changes to the WTB policies are designed to help applicants:

- Reduced planning document requirements A Technical Memorandum prepared by a licensed engineer with cost estimates not older than one year may be accepted in lieu of a full Preliminary Engineering Report.
- Additional time to meet regulatory compliance requirements - Regulatory agencies will certify applicants' compliance with all relevant regulations as part of the Project Application. This will allow applicants to work directly with regulatory agencies much earlier in the process to resolve any compliance issues.



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#### Match Requirement Waivers:

For small water systems that may have difficulty providing the required match, the Board may waive the match requirement when:

- i. The applicant serves fewer than 250 connections and has previously secured WTB funding for the proposed project as defined by planning documents; or
- ii. System upgrade is to consolidate with another system; or
- iii. System upgrade/expansion is to incorporate previously unserved customers (not for future development); and
- iv. Applicant has implemented an asset management plan for the current and future maintenance, replacement and repair of the system.



Water Project Fund Policy Amendments

#### Loan Requirement Waivers:

To assist smaller water systems that may not have the financial capability to take on a loan, the NMFA may waive the loan requirement for water projects when:

- i. The applicant serves fewer than 500 connections and has previously secured WTB funding for the same project: or
- ii. The project is to consolidate with another system.
- iii. To qualify for the loan waiver, the applicant must have implemented an asset management plan for the current and future maintenance, replacement and repair of the system.



#### **Grants for Design:**

The Board may consider awarding 100% grant to "design only" projects with the following conditions:

- i. The project serves or will serve fewer than 500 connections
- ii. Scope is limited to design only "design" is defined as necessary technical work required to prepare a complete and final set of plans and specifications ready to be bid for construction
- iii. Costs for design must be substantiated with a coordinating approved planning document
- iv. Grants for design may not exceed \$500,000.



- Attend the Trainings.
- Submit a **Notice of Intent** to NMFA. Choose a <u>local</u> administrator who is authorized to submit applications for you. This person will be the "**Super User/Primary Contact.**"
- NMFA will assign a **username and initial password** to the Super User and local users. The password should be changed by User.
- Applicant must authorize NMFA (through NOI) to attach any consultants and/or engineers to the applicant profile/application.
- Using your username and password, access the WTB on-line application through the NMFA application system, EnABLE.
- Complete the application and submit it to NMFA via EnABLE.







### **Project Recommendation to Legislature**

- > Projects are prioritized based upon the evaluations by PMT
- > List is culled to the amount expected to be available for FY 2023
- Section 2.3 of the WTB Policies defines targeted annual funding percentages by project type:

	Water Storage, Conveyance or Delivery	50% - 75%
	Water Conservation or Recycling, Treatment or Reuse	15% - 30%
•	Watershed Restoration and Management	10% - 20%
•	Flood Prevention	Up to 10%
•	Endangered Species Act Implementation	Up to 5%

NOTE: The timeline for 2024 WTB cycle will be available in July 2023

Local Government Planning Fund

## **Overview**

- Provides grants up to \$50,000 for planning-related documents
- Communities can qualify for two grants per 24-month period, not to exceed \$100,000
- Matching funds are determined by a community's MHI, and local water rates as compared to state averages
- Local match waivers are based on urgent needs and/or declining economic development
- Applications accepted monthly through EnABLE, NMFA's online application system.



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#### Water Leadership Institute Working in alliance with rural communities

This program aims to support community water leaders, connect them to each other and to regional and external resources, and to forge strong relationships to effectively advocate for their communities' water interests.

The Leadership Institute was created by Rural Community Assistance Corporation (RCAC) in partnership with Western New Mexico University out of a recognition of the need to create sustainable communities and develop the capacity of local leaders working hard to manage local water resources.

Local rural community water leaders must know regional, state, and national challenges and need to be at the center of decision making, shaping solutions to foster community wellbeing. To address this, we are focusing on leadership strengthening topics, community outreach, and water topics from regulatory compliance existing and upcoming regulations, a new era of funding, statewide water planning, resiliency tools, work force development, volunteer recruitment and more which are needed in water decision-making.

We believe that cultivating and strengthening local leadership from within communities, rather than relying on external forces to make resource decisions, will be critical to ensuring that rural communities throughout the Western United States are more resilient in the long term.

#### Goals

The Water Leadership Institute aims to:

- Help build trust and increase the participation and input in local decision-making spaces.
- Strengthen local water leadership and grow new leaders.
- Connect participants to information, opportunities, and resources to effectively advocate for their water interests.
- Create spaces for dialogue, unity, collaboration, and mutual understanding.
- Build a support network of community water leaders.

#### **Building Water Leaders in Biola**

The impact of the Leadership Institute can be felt today in the small rural community of Biola, located just outside of Fresno, California. With a population of 1,440 and a poverty rate of 38.3% as of 2020,, Biola is considered a severely disadvantaged community and faces infrastructure and water management challenges.

But that has not stopped local leaders from pursuing solutions. "There are a lot of needs in Biola: the infrastructure, the sidewalks, curbs, gutters," says Reyes Lozano, a Biola Community Services District board member. "And I want to be part of that solution."

Every member of Biola's board (pictured above) attended the Leadership Institute we hosted in California's Central Valley. Today, the community has a seat on the North Kings Groundwater Sustainability Agency board and the opportunity to advocate for their water needs.
