What is Capital Outlay? Capital improvement projects are funded through (A) Severance Tax Bonds (STB) which are revenues from oil, gas and natural resources through bond capacities and credit rating; or (B) General Funds (GF) which are taxes on oil, gas and natural resources.

- The acquisition, improvement, alteration, or reconstruction of local assets, or
- The maintenance, upgrade, acquirement, and/or repair of local assets.

EX: A fire station project that requires land acquisition, planning, design, construction and equipment.

## Types of Capital Outlay:

- 2-year Projects purchase of equipment, vehicles, etc.
- 4-year Projects construction, rehabilitation, property acquisition, etc.

Reauthorization — Changes to a previously funded project.

- Scope of Work (SOW) or Agency.
- Deadline extensions.


#### **HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION**


- Capital Outlay opened Wednesday, October 19, 2022.
- Pre-Session Deadline: Thursday, January 12, 2023, by 3:00PM.
- Reauthorization Deadline: Monday, February 13, 2023, by 3:00PM.
  - Does not require a legislator's signature.
  - Automatically submitted to the legislators and the Governor.

#### The NM Legislative Session begins on Tuesday, January 17, 2023:

• Legislators and the Governor will be given a list of capital project requests.

Follow up with Legislators / Legislative Aides / Secretaries BEFORE final sponsorship decisions are made.





#### Capital Outlay 2023 Timeline

- Nov Dec 2022: Submit Capital Outlay Requests
- Legislative Session (60-day): January 17 March 18, 2023
- June/October Bond Sales
- July Grant Agreements
- October CPMS Quarterly Reporting (until funding has been fully expended).

Capital Outlay funding is administered and managed by the <u>NMDFA's Capital Outlay Bureau</u>.

Grant Agreement Process for Sponsored Project Requests:

- Applicants must be in compliance with Executive Order 2013-006 (EO-6).
  - $\circ$  registered with the Secretary of State
  - $\circ$  current with audit reporting with the Office of the State Auditor
- Anti-Donation Clause.
  - Funding cannot use state funds to disproportionately benefit one individual, household, entity or organization
- Monthly Reporting through CPMS database. Can be accessed through the ICIP online portal. <u>http://cpms.dfa.state.nm.us/login.aspx</u>



# PROJECTEERING OPPORTUNITIES

## **Projecteering:**

- □ Strongly encourage local governments and small water systems to strategically <u>plan for funding</u>.
- □ Timing is critical!
- □ Taking a "shelved" project to "shovel-ready"...
- □ Steps to follow:
  - 1. ICIP
  - 2. Planning
    - a. Environmental, archeological studies
    - b. Land acquisition
    - c. Preliminary Engineering Report (PER)
  - 3. Match Funding (5% to 50%)
  - 4. Creating Partnerships
  - 5. Funding Programs



#### **Timing Your Projects:**

What are the available funding programs and deadlines?

- 1. CDBG ~ March through August
- 2. WTB ~ August through January
- 3. Capital Outlay ~ November through January
- 4. NMED funding programs ~ depends on program
- 5. NMFA Planning Grants ~ open year-round
- 6. CDBG Planning Grants ~ open year-round

## PRESENTATION FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

## **Funding Strategy:**

It is highly unlikely to get one major project fully funded (by one source) and have it completed within a year. Crucial to plan in phases, especially for larger projects.

An example of a typical capital infrastructure project: New Water System

## **□** Phase I — (a)

- a. acquire land/property, permits, and/or leases, and/or (if necessary)
- b. complete environmental and/or archeological studies, and/or (if necessary)
- c. develop a Preliminary Engineering Report (PER)
- d. match funding: 5% to 50% of total project cost

#### □ Phase II —

- a. complete full project design
- b. range from \$50K to \$350K

## □ Phase III —

- a. final construction
- b. final equipment and/or installation



# **Planning Funding**

## **Planning Funding**

• Local Government Planning Fund-Up to 100 % grant. Grant amount is based on system rates and median household income. A preliminary engineering report (PER), environmental document, asset management plan(s) and master plans are funded through this program. The funding applications are accepted on a monthly basis and can be applied for anytime. Up to \$50,000 award

• **USDA Search Grant**-Requires applicant to submit application under Rural Development Apply. Up to \$30,000

# DWSRLF Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL)

- Funding that will come through DWSRLF through the new BIL over next 5 years.
  - DWSRLF Base Funds 2023 = \$7,283,220
  - DWSRLF Supplemental Funds 2023= \$17,955,000
  - Emerging Contaminants Funding= \$7,540,000(future funding)
  - Lead Service Line Replacement Funds=\$28,275,000(future funding)
- The BIL also creates three new DWSRLF funds that include General Supplemental, Lead Service Line Replacement, and Emerging Contaminants funding with appropriations authorized through 2026.

# **BIL Mandates**

- 49% of federal funds through the General Supplemental and Lead service Line Replacement Funding be provided in additional subsidy to water systems that meet disadvantaged criteria(MHI >75% and less than 100% of National MHI based on most recent 5-year average MHI)
- At least 25% of funds provided through Emerging Contaminants funding be provided as forgivable loans or grants to disadvantaged pws's serving fewer than 25,000 people.
